Monday, January 22, 2024 6:30 p.m.
VIRTUAL MEETING

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Eileen Daly called the Library Board to order at 6:35 p.m. Present, virtually, were Board members Kim Cohen, Eileen Daly, Gail Crockett, Natalia Menjivar, and EJ Greenspan, Library Director Laura Imscher, and Heidi Reagan, recorder.

2. PUBLIC COMMENT - none

3. APPROVAL OF THE CONSENT AGENDA (Items 4 & 8a i, 8a ii, 8a iii.)

MOTION: On a motion made by Gail Crockett and seconded by Natalia Menjivar, the Board unanimously approved the Consent Agenda.

4. THE MEETING MINUTES of November 27, 2023 were approved as part of the consent agenda.

5. CHAIR'S REPORT

- a. Election of Officers – Eileen Daly
 - i. Gail Crockett – Chair
 - ii. EJ Greenspan – Vice Chair
 - iii. Kim Cohen – Secretary

MOTION: On a motion made by Natalia Menjivar and seconded by Kim Cohen, the Board unanimously approved the slate of officers.

6. OLD BUSINESS:

- a. Draft Strategic Plan – Laura Imscher
 - i. The mission statement remained the same except for the addition of the word “resources”.
 - ii. Some ideas heard for the mission were incorporated into the Vision Statement
 - iii. Five Strategic Initiatives were developed to represent the core of what people told us they want for the library and what we’ve been striving to do over the last few years
 - iv. The plan reflects what was learned during the planning process as well as what the Board and the Town have shared with Laura since becoming Director
 - v. Once the plan is approved, Laura will work with staff to create an action plan to achieve the goals over the next four years
 - vi. Laura will provide regular updates to the Board of progress made

MOTION: On a motion made by Kim Cohen and seconded by Natalia Menjivar, the Board unanimously approved the final version of the Strategic Plan.

- b. New Community Center Update – Laura Irmischer
 - i. The selection process for an architect is nearing the final stages
 - ii. Pricing proposals from the top three are being considered
 - iii. Problems with the Faxon Library building continue
 - 1. The basement floods when it rains
 - 2. An issue with the heating lead to closing the library today
 - 3. These issues are a regular reminder of the importance of this project.

7. NEW BUSINESS

- a. FY 25 Budget – Laura Irmischer
 - i. The FY25 budget was submitted to the town on January 3
 - 1. Personnel costs have increased based on contractual obligations and increases in minimum wage levels
 - 2. Operating costs were kept level
 - 3. A \$40k increase was requested for the Collections budget to fund ematerials
 - a. This is reflective of the high cost and high demand for these materials
 - b. The Collections budget has remained flat for five years (it was higher in 2018) and the circulation of ematerials has increased 163% during that time period.
 - ii. Laura will meet with the Town Manager and Finance Director to review the submission and then it will go to Town Council for approval
- b. Annual Report – Laura Irmischer
 - i. This document is a reflection of the many things the library staff has achieved in the past year
 - ii. Thanks go to the library staff for their accomplishments and the P&P Dept. for designing the report
 - iii. The theme is “Welcome Back”
 - 1. By going fine free we are welcoming those who weren’t coming to the library due to outstanding fines
 - 2. Offered numerous big events that brought the community together and focused on an increased focus on in-person programming

Universal Declaration of Human Rights



Pramod coordinated the 75th Annual Celebration of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which was celebrated at the West Hartford Town Hall on Jan 17th, 2024. Thirty-six individuals read the articles from the declaration in 19 languages. Ten organizations set up tables during the event to promote their programs to the attendees, including the library and W.H.I.T. This event was co-sponsored by the United Nations Association of Connecticut and Bombay Olive Restaurant. The WH Library partnered with the West Hartford Human Rights Commission to make this event possible.

West Hartford Immigrant Teens had strong representation at the event. Teen members read articles in 6 different languages. They also sold bracelets and baked goods and collected donations for Heal Africa

Winter Reading Challenge

Rebecca and Lauren introduced the new Winter Reading Challenge Book Chat this year. The program was a great addition to Winter Reading Challenge offerings, giving participants a chance to chat about the books they've been reading and enjoy a hot chocolate and toppings bar. These butterflies, created by local teens, hope to remember the young lives lost and spread the message of hope, acceptance, and kindness.

Virtual Author Talk with Academy Award-Nominated Jena Friedman (31 attended virtually)

Local History

Recent topics of interest in the Local History Room: a group of folks working on family history that visited twice using yearbooks, directories, maps, and census stuff; visitors researching slavery in CT, Rochambeau, folklore, and the always entertaining yearbook pictures of friends and family.

One cool research request came over the phone from a gentleman in California researching the history of his Colt revolver; apparently, it's a rare police issue one that was sent to a few stores by accident in 1918. He was able to trace the first owner/seller to West Hartford and Brett found out that LS Knoek lived in town and owned what we would call a pawn shop in Hartford (on State St.). He took it over from his father who was a tailor that refurbished clothes for the secondhand market. Knoek then expanded on what he sold second-hand: hardware, tools, jewelry, firearms. The store then became a more legit hardware store in the 1920s before closing after Knoek died. Brett and the patron figured out this guy was one of the shops that accidentally was given the Colt 1918 revolvers (or possibly Knoek came about them in a more nefarious way). Brett enjoyed helping the patron, and this project shows how far-reaching local history can be!

As for the year 2023, the overall numbers are 278 in-person visits with 57 virtual/phone requests. Yearbooks have been the most used object in the collection by the general public; Brett plans to fill the few gaps that we have for the high schools in the next year. Brett has found the directories and microfilmed WH newspapers valuable for his own research and looking into stories for patrons. We have a great collection and grateful patrons, and we are thrilled to have this service restored after such a long absence.

Branch Libraries

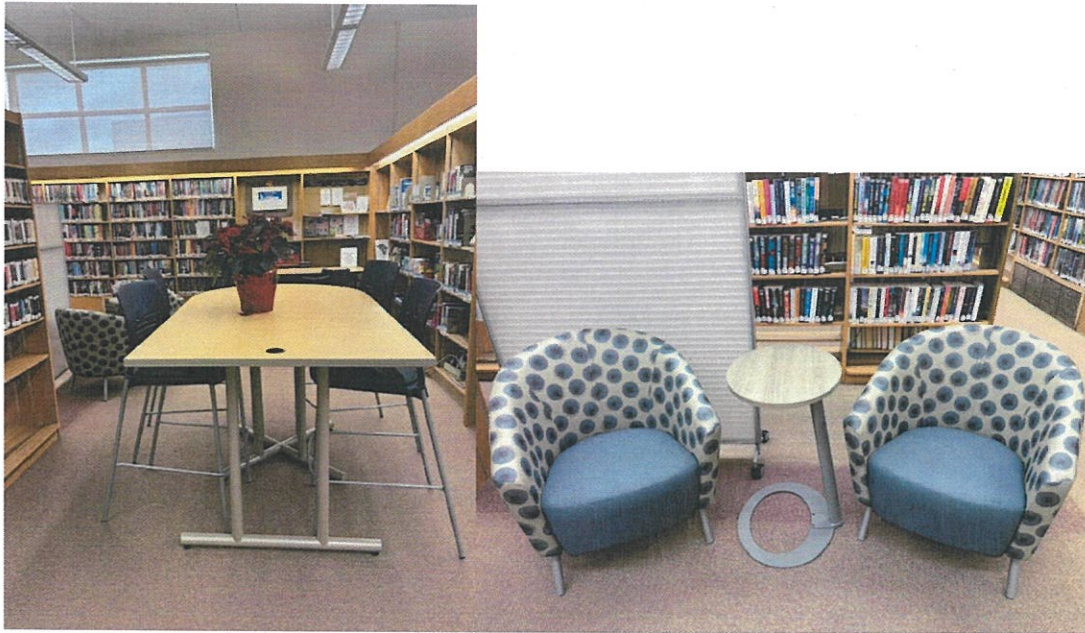
Bishops Corner

Another record was broken at Bishops Corner, we had a total of 227 deliveries to the lockers in January, besting the previous high of 224 from May 2023. We also now have 289 registered locker users.

Children's programs started up again at Bishops Corner and were very well attended. A few families from the American School for the Deaf attended Family Storytime on Thursday along with a translator.

Faxon

Thanks to a generous grant from the Kilfoil fund, the Faxon Library welcome center has gotten a much-needed facelift! Four new tall chairs around the table and two comfy chairs and a laptop table were delivered just before Christmas.



The grant also included \$3,000 for a new and update Welcome Center book collection. Faxon staff will begin ordering for that new collection soon, and in the meantime, we have cleared shelf space in that area by moving the patrons' holds to a new bookcase located right when they walk in the door (and right across from the self-check!)

Tech-Help sessions at Faxon are now offered every Monday from 2-3 pm and on Wednesdays from 4 to 6 pm. Patrons must sign up for a 30-minute session to get help on the computer topic they want to learn. Two volunteers and one Tech staff instruct this program.

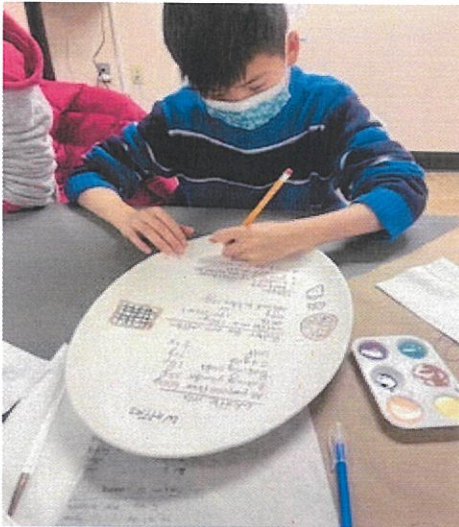
Due to a leakage in the air intake system of the heating system at Faxon, there was no heat in the work area, and the smell from the leaking steam was unbearable. To address the issues, Faxon Library was closed at noon on January 22nd, 2024. The problems were resolved later the same day, and the library was opened to the public the next day.

Children's Services & Programs

Programs

Sara and Leah offered a fun evening of family bonding through painting a family keepsake platter program at the Faxon Branch Library on January 24. Family Keepsake Platters, in partnership with

the Claypen studio, was a workshop for children ages 8 and older with their family members who were asked to bring a family recipe to paint on their own keepsake platter.



Updates

A Toniebox is an innovative audio player for kids 3+ that is great for bedtime stories, music, and education that can be operated independently. Playback starts automatically when Tonies audio characters are placed on the Toniebox. Each library building will have Tonieboxes to circulate. Funding for this project was granted by the West Hartford Library Foundation.



The first in a monthly series of craft programs for tweens to be held in Studio 20 with Kate Wilson facilitating is at 6:00 PM on February 7. The theme will be Valentine's Day crafts.

We have booked the Ballet Theatre Company production of excerpts from their spring show *Snow White* for the evening of April 10, 2024. The event will be held at the West Hartford Conference Center. Funding for this show is generously provided by the Ellen Jeanne Goldfarb Memorial Charitable Trust.

 - These students have presented at the Farmington Library (same students who did Finance in Advance)
